

The space is divided into four. The vertical and the left horizontal dividing lines are irregularly curved and twisted both in outline and in their structure, as though depicting a tree; the right horizontal bough is made of two undulating grooves. The trunk springs from the base area, which is delineated by an uneven line and punctuated by irregularly placed short vertical strokes.

The right-hand quarters contain otherworldly subjects, the left human figures. The facial features are not indicated.



Top right. A large lion reclines on a 'table' composed of a double groove supported on three legs with incurved sides. He faces backwards with fore-legs also stretched out backwards; the feet have no claws and are almost rectangular. His tail is tucked inside the haunch, its tip emerging over his back. To his left four small boughs with leaves (blobs) spring from the tree trunk. Beneath the structure two naked women: one kneels beneath the lion's 'table', leaning forward, supporting herself with one arm resting on the horizontal bough, the other arm being raised up as though touching the 'table'; the other figure kneels on her left knee at the right end of the 'table', reaching up and touching it.

Bottom right. At left, a woman strides up the slightly rising ground with knees bent and right arm bent to touch the tree trunk, left arm hanging; her skirt has V-shaped flounces; excrescences from her forehead and behind her neck (hair? cf. CMS V Suppl. 1B No. 113). To her right, two women in



similar skirts walk or stand facing right, their right arms upraised with palms extended, left arms not shown; their heads are slightly inclined or have a pointed shape like that of birds; against their necks and backs are larger and then smaller blobs. They face, apparently saluting, a griffin with raised wings seated upon a waist-high table; this is composed of two plain legs and a horizontal top, with an extra element extending halfway down the inside of each leg. Behind the griffin stands a woman in full-length skirt with thick belt, left arm bent up with hand almost touching the large horizontal bough, right arm hanging.

At the base of the tree is a 'Minoan dragon' with short legs, its long tail curled up forwards. It is seen in right profile, placed at an angle as though facing downwards on slightly hilly ground.

Bottom left. Four humans, all facing right towards the tree; all but the first are walking on the rising ground. Left, a man with left arm bent up, right arm hanging; he is slightly smaller than the other three. Then a woman in a skirt with V-shaped flounces, both arms bent up. Then a similar woman, her right arm bent outwards at the elbow, her left bent to grasp the hand of the man in front leading her. His head is inclined back towards her; his left arm is bent, with forearm close to the tree trunk and almost touching it; small blobs indicate his abundant long hair.

Top left. Two facing pairs of people, all with long hair indicated by small blobs. Left, a pair of women facing each other. The woman to left, naked, sits leaning somewhat forward with right leg forward, left leg tucked back; right arm hanging down, with palm outstretched behind her, left arm bent up at the elbow. The woman to right, naked or in a long skirt (? - but her legs look bare), squats holding both arms bent up at the elbow. To right, another facing pair: the man to left, wearing a belted kilt, right arm bent back at the elbow, left arm not shown; the woman to right, in knee-length skirt with V-shaped dipping flounces, both arms bent up. In the field above appear in profile two large-winged insects and two blobs rather oval in shape with a small excrescence at the top, like chrysalises.




Bezel: L. 1.0, W. 0.2, Th. max. 0.4. Hoop: inner \O 1.10 \times 1.3, W. 0.4, Th. 0.1, Wt. 5.4 gm

Holes in the bezel: a sizable hole in the left-hand oval object, a small hole in the second oval object and near the bottom of the standing figure's skirt

'Kydonia, grave near site' [49] (Acc. Reg. in D. G. Hogarth's hand: 'seen in 191- at Canea by both Sir A. Evans and D. Engraved and punched, with no embossing. Gold can clearly be seen heaped up at the edges of the

hollows. To left stands a female figure, not quite upright, with one arm bent up across her chest, the other forearm pointing horizontally left, her head slightly inclined to the right: dancing? She wears a heavily flounced skirt with thick belt. Her feet are not shown. To right another female kneels against the nearer one of two large oval objects, her left forearm resting along the top of it, her right hand touching it. She wears no obvious skirt; a line across her near ankle sits in the position of an anklet. From the second object and from between the two emerge slightly wavy lines. In the field above and between the two figures is a small standing male figure with one arm raised vertically, the other outstretched horizontally; in the former hand he holds an object (a dagger?), in the latter a bow. All three figures have flowing locks. Floating in the field above the kneeling woman are an ear and an eye (or mouth?). Below, a groundline divided by vertical lines, as though to represent paving.

Commentary: C. Sourvinou-Inwood's arguments for authenticity on stylistic grounds (Kadmos 10, 1971, 60–9) are taken as definitive; see Ogden, MycGoldRings and Krzyszkowska, AS 333 on the subsequent technical confirmation. The assembly process is as 280, 281 etc. although the joins are less easy to see on this ring (J. Ogden pers. comm. after autopsy). The erroneous 'Vaphio' provenance arose from misunderstanding.



Hoop dented and bent sideways, its join to the bezel repaired with a patch

Bezel: L. 2.0, W. 1.2, Th. 0.32. Hoop: \varnothing 1.42 \times 1.55, W. 0.6, Th. 0.22, Wt. 4.1 gm

Engraved and punched. A woman with long tresses, wearing a long skirt with a deep V flounce, stands facing left, although her feet point to the right; her left arm hangs, the right is bent and extended. Her right hand touches a rectangular structure composed of two uprights, each made of a double line, and a two-part horizontal top, the upper part of which extends farther than the lower; between the uprights there is apparently a small object. It stands upon a heap of ball-shaped rocks from which springs at each side, at the base of the structure, a curved line, probably a leafless branch. On the top, 'horns of consecration' from which spring a similar branch. To the right of the woman a tree, its trunk

shown by a double vertical line, its foliage in three clumps. A horizontal line in tremolo work runs from the base of the structure, then behind the woman at knee height, to the right edge, at the ground-level of the tree. Curved tremolo lines run either side of the woman from this 'base' line to the lower edge of the field; below the tree straighter ones form an inverted triangle with a central vertical line. Another runs from the 'horns of consecration' down to the base of the tree, passing above the woman's head. Behind her head it is joined at right angles by another, which curves down to the right end of the 'base' line.

Commentary: Overall the quality is inferior. The woman's feet point backwards. The profusion of lines in the field is hard to understand, not least the 'base' line, which would seem to imply that the woman stands level with the top of the rocks. C. Sourvinou-Inwood sees a 'dissolved' version of the syntax of Minoan ritual scenes (JHS 110, 1990, 197 f. n. 29, pl. V b). The Ashmolean has three electrotype replicas and three ordinary impressions from Evans's collection. On the skirt, just below the waist, a tiny lump of gold remains from the soldering. The construction is flimsy but features such as the join of bezel and hoop are genuine (J. Ogden pers. comm. after autopsy).

Hoop bent out of shape and broken away from the bezel at the top. Engraving very sharp and fresh

'Recently found near Candia [39], acquired by an archaeological traveller in 1927' (PM II 250), 'very probably from the harbour town of Knossos.....now in my own Collection' (PM IV 953 f.).


Engraved and punched, with no embossing: sharp edges of the hollows can be seen.

A woman in a flounced skirt stands, her head frontal and slightly inclined towards the man to her right; her left arm is bent and held across her waist. Behind her is an oval object with flat top. To her

right, perhaps holding her hand, stands a man; his other arm is outstretched in the direction of a boat in which, at the left end, stands the steersman with steering-oar or pole, facing them; behind him, also facing left, are seven schematically depicted figures of oarsmen, with possibly a seated figure at the right end.

On the side of the boat are five zigzags. Below the boat three dolphins or fish leap to the right. Above the boat, in the air, stands a small figure in a short bell-shaped garment, left arm bent, right arm outstretched towards the man; the man's arm may be gesturing towards this figure rather than towards the boat. Behind it in the air are incomprehensible entities, variously interpreted.

Commentary: Early doubts expressed by B. Schweitzer and M. Bieber (see A. von Salis, *Neue Darstellungen*, 1935–36 ut infra) were followed by Kenna but few others. See Ogden ut infra and Krzyszkowska, AS 333 on the technical confirmation of authenticity. The hoop, having grooved ribs, is thus slightly more elaborate than the plain-ribbed hoop of e.g. 281.







Bezel: L. 2.2, W. 1.2, Th. max. 0.32. Hoop: inner \varnothing 1.20 \times 1.30, W. 0.35, Th. 0.1. Wt. 5.3 gm

Surface somewhat worn and scratched, particularly towards the right end behind the female figure. On the right edge of the bezel, beyond the edge of the impression, there is a small place where the gold is dented and 'pushed up'. Probable signs of some re-engraving on the right side of the lower part of the motif (see Description). Hoop bent slightly out of shape

'Knossos' [37] (not certain). Bought by Evans in Herakleion [39] 1894 together with 273 and 318.

A woman in full skirt and with one arm held towards her brow (i.e. as though 'saluting'; the other arm is not seen) faces the hovering small figure of a man holding a short staff upright in one outstretched arm, his other arm akimbo; from behind his head two rows of horizontal dots (flying locks? sunrays?). Behind is a structure with open doorway, its jambs ribbed, through which we see a pillar. It has a flat roof of two mouldings above which show three fronds of a tree. Before the structure is a tall tapering pole with ringed base. Leftwards from this base runs a groundline from which five (originally more?) vertical lines run down, suggesting paving. Behind the woman are various cuttings, perhaps not all as intended, some resembling vegetation (and variously interpreted). At the right end of the bezel are four irregular blobs which look perhaps unintentional. The lower part of the skirt and the groundline area beneath it seem to have been reengraved, perhaps to make good a damaged area (the surface of the adjacent area to the left is still in




somewhat poor condition). The skirt changes half-way down: the engraving becomes deeper and the flounces and general outline of the skirt are interrupted and replaced by two groups of plain horizontal lines (cf. skirt design CMS II,3, No. 51; V Suppl. 2, No. 106), one group beginning higher up than the other; they appear somewhat awkward, looking almost more like a 'base' than an integral part of the skirt. At the bottom left corner of the skirt, projecting into its deeply engraved horizontal edge, can be seen a tiny vertical line; this perhaps belonged to the 'paving', which may thus have originally continued farther to the left, or it may conceivably have belonged to the original hem of the skirt, the last survivor of an obliterated row of hemweights or decorations (as on CMS I No. 220).

The structure is depicted as a rectangle with a central vertical line; upon it a double axe. Traces of a groundline.

Commentary: The piece presents some anomalies. The motif has no exact parallel. The incising is

done entirely with a point (no drill work) and is quite light, especially on the rectangular structure. The vert. perf. (bored from both ends, meeting neatly) is unconventional for such a subject.

Across her shoulders, a curving line like a ‘snake frame’ (but with tips less strongly upcurved than on other examples). Her skirt, knee-length, has two horizontal lines at the waist, a V, then a vertically hatched panel. Flanking her is a pair of griffins, their hind legs on the groundline, forepaws resting level with the bottom of her skirt. Their wings are upraised and include three arcs made with a tubular drill. Their tails, raised in an S shape, are composed of a series of wheel cuts, not made with the drill.

Commentary: Doubts were raised by curious and apparently confused elements of iconography, but see J. H. Betts, CMS X 31 for refutation. The material and the horizontal perf., well paralleled for such subjects but not known to a pre-1920s forger, are certainly genuine.

The join of bezel and hoop is somewhat messy, with the gold of the bezel overlapping onto the hoop and with some little holes. At the upper join of hoop and bezel the central band of granulation swerves to the left; its neighbour to the right is closer to it than is that to the left. A tiny hole in the paving. The edge of the bezel below the bull's near forefoot is slightly bent up out of shape. The finger-bed is not entirely smooth.



Motif punched and engraved. A bull-leaping scene. A bull runs to the right with forelegs stretched out stiffly in front of him and hind legs extended, head raised and long tail raised almost vertically for half its length, then bent and hanging. A figure with short curly hair, wearing a belt and loincloth, vaults backwards over the bull's hindquarters, his long arms touching the bull's flanks, his legs bent down above the bull's tail, his feet hanging slightly above the bull's feet. The bull's ribs are shown; his neck has curved striations; his shoulder is massive. The upper part of his forelegs is heavy, the near leg being made up of four drill-channels. Before the bull a 'sacral knot' (?) in the field. The groundline is double and interrupted with vertical lines, as though to represent paving; one vertical line of the paving does not run up all the way to meet the horizontal.






Commentary: Both subject and execution are puzzling. What activity is being depicted? The small animals' attitude is more that of suckling young than of attacking hounds. The large animal's slender body does not look bovine. The head and neck are not at one with it and their present form probably resulted from a mistake in the work.
